SENIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

What a year! I didn't think we would not be very busy last year because of Covid-19; however, I was in for a big surprise. January went well and we carried on as usual with worship, noonday prayers and a workday. We took the precautions needed as advised by Bishop Doyle for Covid-19: masks, social distancing, washing hands, removing prayer books and hymnals from the pews and disinfecting the entire church. Then the winter freeze occurred and everything changed. As you know, the cooling tower froze and the parts to fix it had to be ordered because they are custom. **Rip, Haynes and Kent spent countless hours, days and months working on it.** They all worked tirelessly on getting the cooling tower problem solved. **We owe them a heaping dose of gratitude for the selfless, unpaid work they do at St. George's.**

Our Valentine's Day plans were canceled because of the freeze, but we did manage to deliver the Valentine's packages later to our members. March went well. We had a workday which was very well attended. We made palm crosses for Palm Sunday, placed the prayer books and hymnals back in the pews as directed by the Bishop and generally cleaned the church for Easter. A big thank you is due to all who participated.

A wedding for Audrey Dominy was planned for April 10th but because of the cooling tower still being down, the church was too warm and we had to cancel those plans and move to Santa Fe Pentecostal for the ceremony. We also had some very good news in April. We baptized 4 children, which was a joy. Lunch followed. Easter dinner went very well. We had at least 40 in attendance and several stayed for lunch. We also had our church retreat and made 90 day goals which the Mission and Vision Teams were to execute.

May had its challenges. The fleas invaded! We had to bring in the flea patrol several times to finally get them exterminated. We met in Quin Hall and had a "picnic" lunch afterwards. It turned out to be fun with 22 in attendance at the "picnic." The game day in May was a lot of fun with over 15 in attendance. We also had a reception honoring recent graduates Roxanne and Preston.

Then came June and, as a direct result of no air conditioning, mildew grew rampant in the church. Rip got busy and called the diocese for direction. As a result of the mildew and with possible health issues for some of our members, we had to take our services virtual. We also canceled noonday prayer for a while. Jonathan Blaker told Rip to lease portable air conditioners, which he did. He and Haynes had to check on them several times a day and empty the overflow.

Because of the mildew problem, we had game day in July at Rigo's. It was well attended; however, we had to postpone the next game day because of the rise in the Delta variant. We also had to cancel confirmations because of Covid. The mildew problem was an ongoing problem for several months. We received several quotes from building cleaners to mitigate the mildew and received \$15,000.00 from our insurance company. Since Raquel is a mechanical engineer, we thought it appropriate to appoint her as project manager and she is helping with the church insurance.

We met with Michael Hilfinger from the Diocese in August concerning the mildew damage to the carpets in the church caused by the portable air conditioners. He agreed that the damage was done by the portable air conditioners. We received money from the insurance company to replace carpeting in the halls and sanctuary; however, it isn't enough to do the whole job so we're going to start with the hall carpets. Then in September, Robin told us she was resigning because of our financial situation. Members donated a bracelet from James Avery as her departing gift. Her last day was October 10th. We had a reception at Casa Fiesta in her honor.

The parts for the cooling tower finally came in, were installed, and we are now able to meet in the church in person. We actually started in person in October. So we started cleaning the church and had at least 10 workdays with several people helping out. We cleaned the sanctuary, the sacristy and the altar guild room and continued cleaning one room at a time until it was all clean. My gratitude to all who helped. It could not have been done without you. The prayer books and hymnals are cleaned and placed back in the pews.

All Saints Day was celebrated with hanging of paper strips with names on them. November 14th was the ingathering for stewardship with a potluck luncheon. Under the leadership of Raquel, the Advent series went very well. The discussions were very lively and enjoyable. Office hours have started up again. Hours are Tuesday through Thursday from 9AM until noon. Noonday prayer is also starting up again in February. December brought in Christmas celebrations. The decorating of the church was fun and all enjoyed the BBQ that Olive brought. Jim McGill served at the Christmas Eve service which ended with the candle lighting reminding us that Jesus is the light of the world. The vestry has changed our by-laws to reflect the decreasing membership of our congregation. Sharon will go over that.

Several people attended the meeting with Joann Saylor last Sunday. She basically **said that it is up to us as to how we want to proceed.** I would like to have your input on this. **She is sending Thomas Morris from the Diocese to visit us once a month starting in February.** He works with small congregations like us.

JUNIOR WARDEN'S REPORT

1. February 2021 Freeze—Due to the extended loss of power (inability to circulate) during the very low temperatures, there was extensive damage to the outside piping associated with the cooling tower as well as damage to the tubing bundle within the cooling tower. After consultation with the church insurance agency, approval was given to 100% replacement cost and a new bundle was ordered from Hunton Industries. There was a long lead time for manufacturing due to this freeze being an almost nationwide event, but the new bundle was installed and the system returned to service in late August and even after having been sitting idle for over six months, all nine of the operating units came back on line with no significant issues noted. During this time we bypassed the cooling tower and used the loop circulating pump to complete and thorough cleaning of the loop using chemical cleaning and a swimming pool pump filter (thanks Kent Ross for most of this work). The cooling tower basin was also cleaned and a new pump filter screen installed.
2. Temporary AC units were rented from Hunton Industries to provide what turned out to be the bare minimum cooling needs to get us through the summer. but due to less than adequate dehumidification, we started having problems with what was thought to be mold, but after professional sampling, turned out to be mildew. The rental costs again were covered at 100% from church insurance, as were costs incurred with the cleaning of the mildew.
3. We also received a significant payment to be used toward replacement of carpet and flooring as we see fit.
4. During the early summer we experienced an almost overwhelming outbreak of fleas, and Berrett Pest Control treated the entire facility (inside and out) twice which seemed to have resolved the issue. There are also two rat bait stations around the building perimeter being maintained on a monthly basis.
5. After 53 years of faithful service, the kitchen stove was replaced with two residential units, with the funds for the stoves having been donated to the church.
6. Routine issues continue, with both toilets in the men's room having been repaired internally, major service completed on the riding lawn mower, conversion of fluorescent fixtures to LED, and north wall of the church being painted (work in progress).

Thanks to Haynes Dunn and Kent Ross for their hours and hours of time and moral support as well as others who have contributed to cleaning the facility and returning us to service.
